If it were up to you, how many lives would have been saved by using the blood you donated? How many infants, newly born and needing blood, would grow up if their lives depended on your blood donation? How many of your friends and relatives would be alive today if their lives had depended on your gift of blood?

Suzy Barnes, Blood Services, id "Last year, seven months out of twelve, blood had to be sent in from other communities". Suzy said that during December and January alone, 88 units of blood had to be sent in, because Texarkana did not have the blood needed.

The blood in your veins is today's most amazing medicine. It has become a miracle worker. Blood already does more lifesaving than any one of our wonder drugs. We have only begun to penetrate its warm mystery and to discover how to use blood to save lives, fight disease, and maintain normal health.

Anyone from 17-65 who is in good health can give blood. A person who has had a recent serious illness or history of certain disease may be prohibited.

Eligible people can give a pint of blood as often as every eigh weeks. Fluid volume is restored within a few hours, but it takes 3.4 weeks for the red cells to be replenished.

Donating blood is painless and does not consume much time. From the time you enter the center until you leave, should not exceed 30 minutes. The actual drawing of the blood takes less than 10 minutes.

The mobile unit will be parked on the main parking lot. Everyone wishing to donate blood should drop by the foyer of the student center and set up an appointment.

After a brief interview and tests such as weight, tempature, pulse rate and blood preassure, one unit of blood is taken while in a comfortable reclining position. A short rest period with light refreshments will follow.

Giving blood is a continous cycle. Every five seconds some one in the United States receives a blood transfusion, yet only 3% o fall Americans are donating 100% of all blood given. Blood must be replenished every 21 days and it is up to you to see that Texarkana has the blood supply we need.

Remember the importance and immediate need for blood. Give your share November 29-30, when the Blood Mobile will be located on the TCC Campus. This blood drive is being sponsored by the TCC Circle K Club.

Sue McCrossen is the Music Director and Nancy Keyton is the Director Designer.


Development growth plans for continued

General topics and the definition of "staff development", its purposes, goals, and means of fulfillment, were discussed at the first meeting of the TCC Committee on staff development, last week.

Dr. Carl Nelson, president of TCC, opened the discussion by stating that he did not believe in meetings for the sake of meetings. He did feel that staff development was a worthwhile project. "We ought to have some means of improving ourselves., in order that we might do a better joband staff development can do just that-once we determine what the needs are, what the desires are, and what the budget will be," said Dr. Nelson. He also said that the staff members can look at staff development on three fronts: growth as a human being or individual; growth as a teacher; and better knowledge of subject matter.

Dean Levi Hall said that Don Bass of the College of the Mainland is heading a federal program which was allocated \$500,000 to

When Dell Jacobs first began
teaching business courses at
TCC, the present buildings did
not exist.

She taught in the Pine Street Junior High building where P. S. J. H. S., Texas High, and TCC were all housed.

Are students now different from those over 20 years ago? No, she says. They have a tendency always to revert to the norm. The 70's students are more self-aware and centered toward self than the 60's students who tended to be more activitist in nature. But, Jacobs added that TCC has never really gone full cycle to either extreme.

She also feels that most TCC students are nice and polite, but smiled and said someone once told her the students were that way only because she was.

What about changes in TCC? Well, the dorm life was not well received by the students, nor was it economically feasible, so it was phased out. The girls' dorm was the first to go. Interscholastic football died with the dorms and basketball was soon to follow.

The "jeans" of those days were skirts, sweaters, bobby

socks, hair ribbons, and the undying saddle shoe. According to Jacobs, the girls were just as pretty then and the boys were just as much fun.

People are the same now as they were then, she says as she leans back and enjoys her cozy office. "Truth never changes, only people's concept of it."

Jacobs is a past president of the Faculty Association and also the Bowie County chapter of TSTA. She received her education at various institutions including the University of Texas and the University of Arkansas; however, she went to junior college right here at TCC.

Before coming here, she taught in the Dallas public schools.

Jacobs says she loves to travel. This past summer she and her husband cruised the Mediterranean and toured Egypt, Israel, Turkey and Greece. The people were very gracious toward her as an American. Jacobs feels that people will return the same feelings shown.

She also reads avidly—"from Pluto to Plato!".

When asked about the quality of education at TCC she replied, "Education is a good teacher and a good student."

Many people don't just want a job; they want work.


Liz Ray had a job but she didn't have work. Carter should concentrate on creating work . . . not jobs.


