## **Grad Fees** Upped



# Gives Dim Forecast for Education

Texas State Representative Hamp Atkinson recently told a group of approximately 30 TCC students and faculty members "that education and the tax payer are on a collision course." Atkins son who is chairman of the Public Education Committee, made the remark at a November 9 Phi Theta Kappa sponsored presentation in the Classroom Building.

According to Atkinson, one of the major problems in state supported education is that the large four year institutions such as the University of Texas and Texas A & M are continually constructing more buildings and hiring new teachers, even though their enrollments are dropping.

The community colleges, on the other hand are not allowed to spend state money for construction, for the payment of utility bills, or for the maintenance of existing facilities. Atkinson went on to say that there is "if the Speaker is against a bill, every bill.

Kegains

a growing movement in the state legislature to have schools return to the three R's, because of the disappointing results of some high school literacy test scores.

Part of these low scores can be attributed to the fact that the state is forcing kids to stay in school that a few years ago, were dropping out and filling most of the low paying - low skill jobs.

In addition to education, Atkinson commented on many aspects of the Texas Legislature including the importance of the Speaker of the House, the role of the lobbyists, the "Killer Bees", and the Governor.

Atkinson said that one of the most important votes that he makes at the legislature is the vote he casts for Speaker of the House, because the Speaker is all - powerful in the legislative matters. Atkinson stated that

then the bill does not stand much of a chance of passing", because he controls virtually every committee through his power of appointment. The Speaker appoints the chairman, vice chairman, and half the members of every committee, so in effect, he can put all his opponents on one of two committees and then not assign them very much to do.

The lobbyists perform a very important function in that while they try to get a representative's support for their cause, they also keep him informed on the progress of a particular bill. Atkinson said that "a good lobbyist will never lie because lying destroys his credibility".

Atkinson did not condone the actions of the twelve "killer bee" senators because he feels that every member of the legislature has been elected to vote on

Texarkana College was reinstated as parlimentarian at the second Region III meeting of the Texas Junior College Student Government Association held at Cedar Valley Junior College, in Dallas, Saturday, November 10. The reinstatement occurred as the result of discussion on why TCC had been replaced at the first meeting of the semester. The main item of business, other than the ironing out of the communication problem, was the discussion of a possible "bulletin". Each member college will contribute ideas and information about things that they have sponsored. The next Region III meeting will be held at TCC Saturday, December 8. At the present time, arrangements are incomplete, but the TJCSGA

The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced that it will make available to qualified applicants grants that are designed to provide young people, between the ages of 15 and 25, with funds enabling them to pursue independent projects in the humanities. This assistance will be administered through the recently expanded Youth grants program. More than 100 awards are offered to those who have not completed academic or professional training. This program is not designed to provide financial aid for thesis work, although undergraduate work which seems assured of public dissemination can be supported. Some of the areas in which applicants can pursue study include history, ethnic studies, folklore, anthropology, linguistics and the his-
