Center Harold Honea dropped in two free shots after the final buzzer to put down the defending national champs in junior college basketball, who, incidentally are picked to repeat for the title. Jim Pack led the Texarkana scorers with 25 points.

In the second game the Bulldogs were ambushed by the Tyler Apaches to the tune of 91-78. The weary Bulldogs ran neck and neck with the Apaches in the first half, but Tyler's superior height showed up in the second half to put down the Canines. Honea was high for Ann O'Rear with nine. the Bulldogs with 18 points.

The Hounds then journeyed to Kilgore for a rematch with the revenge-minded Rangers. In the first half Kilgore pulled ahead and from then on it was a runaway. The Kilgore Cagers couldn't be suppressed and emerged with night. Clarington led all the way a 107-66 victory. Honea was again high point man with 20 points.

The Texarkana College girls brought their season record to 0-3 in a game with Clarington Friday to win 66-32. Lou Hulsey was again high scorer with 14 points; Norma Renfro followed with 13.

Lou Hulsey is leading scorer for the Bulldogettes with 45 points in 3 games. The girls will be idle until January 12 when they go on the hardwoods against Weatherford in the Tiger gym.

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Coach Jimmie Jones' Texarkana Bulldogs face some of the toughest Junior College basketball competition in the nation on the 18, 19 and 20 in the Tyler JC Tournament in Apache Gym, Tyler.

Kilgore, Tyler, Paris, Wharton, Del Mar, Texarkana, Lon Morris and other highly regarded quintets will be fighting it out in the threeday tourney. Kilgore is rated first in the nation-picked by the National Junior College Committee to repeat their national championship title. Tyler is ranked eighth in the nation.

However, the Bulldogs downed Kilgore, and the Rangers also lost to Lon Morris in Jacksonville. Paris defeated Tyler in Tyler, dropped in 11 points to lead the making things even tighter and Texarkana Club, followed by Jo giving more of a championship air to the tourney in Tyler next

> The Bulldogs have improved rapidly and are actually better than their 1-2 record indicates. They have lost to Kilgore and Tyler while defeating Kilgore at Tiger Gym in Texarkana. The Hounds will also get a taste of what Texas Junior College Conference play will be like, watching Paris and Lon Morris in the tournament.

> In their first three games, the Bulldogs started three sophomores and two freshmen on the starting lineup. Harold Honea, 6' 4" center from Hope, Ark., looks like the most promising freshman prospect. Jerry King, 6' 1" freshman from Texas High in Texarkana, has been starting at a forward post and is progressing rapidly.

> Guards DeWayne Hardage and Jim Pack have been fairly consistent in outside play, hitting well on long shots and driving well. Hardage and Pack are both sophomores, as is Wayne Combs, the forward from Fouke, Ark.

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#### **WUS Announces** Board of Sponsors Gladden Children

World University Service has announced the composition of its Board of Sponsors for the forthcoming year.

The list, which includes 29 college presidents, was issued recently by the American headquarters of the international student relief organization.

The Board is an advisory body composed of individuals prominent in education and international affairs. The major responsibility of its members is to offer support, advice, and guidance in the fields of their competence.

The international agency provides relief and educational assistance to students and university groups in approximately 40 countries.

Last year 603 colleges in the United States donated almost onethird million dollars to World University Service. This student support is a unique feature of the university relief agency. Except for some funds received from foundations, all contributions to WUS are solicited only from student and university groups.

The funds that are raised are expended on overseas programs aimed at helping university students complete their education.

In Europe, WUS offers aid to refugees; provides scholarships, medicines, and food; and contributes to the operation of an international rest and rehabilitation center for students.

In the Middle East, where the university community is plagued with a shortage of housing, WUS undertakes the constructions of student dormitories.

In Africa, WUS works at overcoming the barriers of isolation that separate students and nationality groups. One of WUS' activities provides scholarships for Africal medical students.

In Asia, housing and health programs are most urgently needed. In ten countries of this area, WUS conducts its activities - building TB sanatoria and student dormitories, providing books and medicines and food and offering schol- TC Trio Entertains

- Store in glasses, let stand 2 days before using.
- (4) If it is to be kept longer cover with paraffin.
