Academic Promise, Need Merits ETSU Spring Scholarship

Ten institutional scholarships, \$125 each, will be awarded by the University Scholarship Committee at ETSU at Texarkana. The scholarships will be offered to students showing academic promise and financial need for the 1974 Spring Semester.

Students must have an overall average of at least 2.8 in order to apply. Anyone applying (including TC students), must enroll for at least nine hours at ETSU if they are undergraduate students and six semester hours if they are graduate students.

Applications may be picked up in the ETSU Admissions Office, Room 320. All application material must be returned to the Financial Aid no later than Jan. 28, 1974. Further information may be secured by calling 838-0508.

Spring Registration One Day Affair

Spring registration is going to be a little different. It will be a one day process.

Night students will register on Jan. 9. Students with last names starting with the letters A-L will register from 6-7:30 p.m. Students with last names starting with the letters M-Z will register from 7:30-9 p.m.

Jan. 10 is the date for students to register. Sophomores (30 or more hours) in the morning. Students with last names starting L-S, 8-9 a.m.; T-Z and A-C 9-10 a.m.; and D-K, 10-11:30 a.m.

Freshman (students with less than 30 hours) will register L-S, 1-2 p.m.; T-Z and A-C, 2-3 p.m.; and D-K, 3-4 p.m.

K. B. Davis, registrar, said, "If a student would like to save some time, we have already started preliminary registration."

Spring Senate Vacancies To Be Filled By Appointment With Senate Approval

Indications were at the Student Senate meeting last week that two, possibly three members of the senate would resign for various reasons and not be members of the senate during the spring semester.

None of those who indicated they probably would resign have submitted letters of resignation to Senate President Bill Ferguson or Dean of Students Bill Hughes, and it will not definitely be known until after registration how many vacancies will need to be filled, but plans already are being made to fill them.

Ferguson said that he, as president, will submit a number of names of students whom he will recommend to fill the vacancies. This list will be submitted at the first Senate meeting of the new semester, and, if approved, the new members will take office at the following meeting.

Early indications are that

two sophomore and one freshman office vacancies will need to be filled.

"Students who ran a pretty close race in the September Senate elections will receive top consideration for the positions," Ferguson said, "but it will be up to the Senate to make the final decision on the new officers."

Dean Hughes said, "The senate is not bound to approve Bill's recommendations, but it has been their custom in past situations to do so."

"Approval of the past president's recommendations always promotes a much closer working relationship between the senate and the president," Hughes continued.

Another election to fill the spots was not feasible, according to Ferguson, because it is against senate rules to have an election during dead week and it would not be practical to have an election next semester because of the student turnover from the fall semester.

Joy In Creating, Sharing

Again and again, it all comes back to "together". In drama, a production can't hope to come off well if only one or two actors really care about what they're doing. They may do a good job themselves, but the worth of the play won't come across unless the cast works as an ensemble, **creating something together** which will glorify the cast as a group and not as individuals.

Every drama freak knows this, but what this tells him further is what ties him closer to the art. Maybe it also explains why man has always been attracted to drama, why its origin coincides with that of man, and why it has advanced alongside man, reflecting his progress, even his regression, through the centuries.

In drama, man has seen the hope and the possibility that life doesn't have to be the way it is, that he can forget who he is and become someone else, perhaps someone better. In drama, as in his life, man has discovered the joy in creating something beautiful and even more joy in sharing it with someone else. He has realized that only by working together can we hope to make his life a "hit."

He has seen the similarity between a play script and a book of ideals, perhaps for the Christian, the Bible. In a play script, as in the Bible, he is given his character through lines, his stage directions, and his motivations for acting — or living.

But, most important of all, he has discovered that both are virtually worthless unless they are enacted — unless he recreates the portrayed character in himself and works together with the others to make a "hit."

There it is in a nutshell. When you come right down to it, all of us should be drama freaks — working together to create something beautiful.

Grants Available

Students still have time to apply for some of the \$122.1 million that is available in the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants program for the 1973-74 school year.

Basic Grants, which are funded by the U. S. Office of Education, are available to first-time students who began their post-high school education or training after July 1, 1973, on a full-time basis. These grants can be used at any eligible institution including community or junior colleges, vocational or technical schools, and hospital schools of nursing — both public and private, profit and non-profit.

Grants are based on a formula which takes into account the cost of tuition, fees, room, board, books, supplies, and incidental expenses, and the amount the student and his or her family can contribute. It is not a loan that had to be paid back.

Students may obtain an application form for a Basic Grant through their financial aid officer or guidance counselor, or by writing to Box G, Iowa City, Iowa 52240.

Crucial Aid To Children

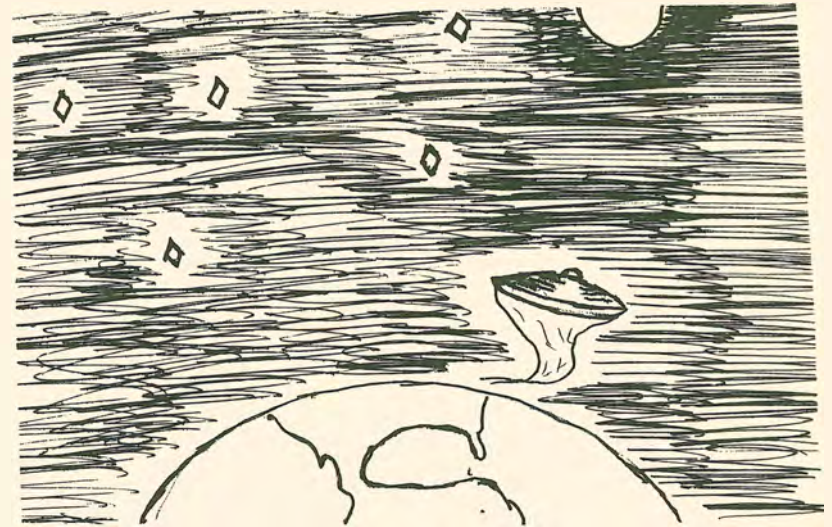
Some 7,000,000 children across the world have had to be dropped from CARE's child-nutrition programs, because of reductions in U. S. Food for Peace commodities allocated to private American agencies for humanitarian use overseas.

To continue daily supplementary feedings for 20,000,000 persons — almost all, children — during the coming year, and to provide emergency food aid for 6,000,000 refugees and disaster victims, the 1973 holiday-season CARE Food Crusade seeks to raise 7,300,000, Frank L. Goffio, executive director, announced.

"Painful decisions have had to be made to drop large groups of preschool and school-children in countries where hunger and malnutrition are the biggest killers of the young, and cause permanent physical and mental damage in millions who survive," Mr. Goffio said.

"CARE is hopeful Food for Peace cuts may be restored in the months ahead. Meanwhile, we must appeal to the public to respond generously, so that most crucial programs can be maintained."

While U. S. agricultural donations are the mainstay of the programs, CARE also buys other foods to match local needs. Host governments help too, by contributing distribution costs according to their abilities. Public contributions cover the remaining delivery and purchase costs. Circle K, the local service organization on campus, rendered its service last Friday night by working the parking at the Emerald Ball, Texarkana's biggest seasonal charity event.

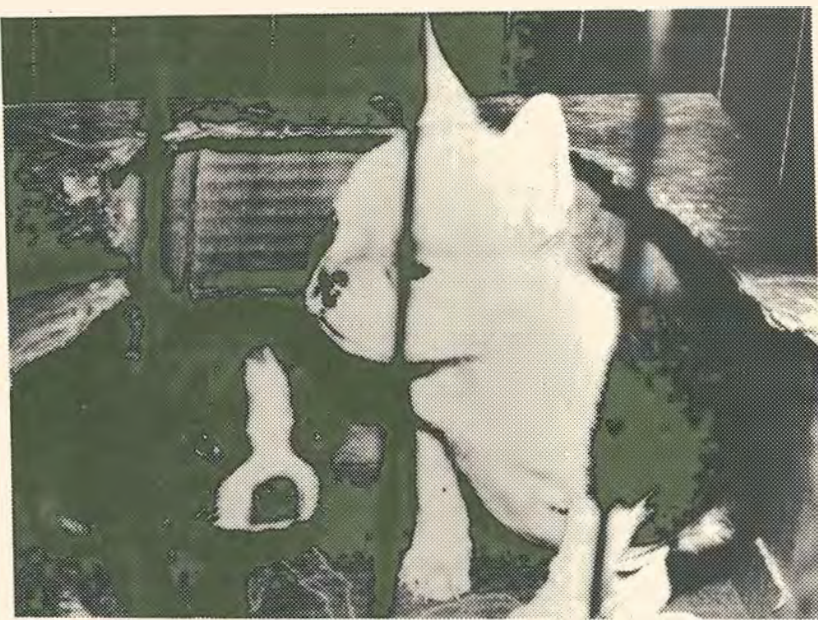
Debbie Maple Named Ag Club Sweetheart

Swimming, Basketball, Bowling Wind Up Action

Christmas holidays are coming up, and it is time for bowl games and pro championships. From me to you, have a nice holiday. Now, on with the sports.

Only one record was broken in the recent intramural swim meet held Dec. 6, and Bob Click had the honor of doing it. In the 50 yd. butterfly event, Bob swam it in 37.4 seconds, beating out Noel Durbin's old record of 39.8 set last spring.

In other events, Noel Durbin came in first on the 50 yd. freestyle with 28:8 seconds. Gary Ricker and Joe Johnson placed second and third, respectively. Barbara Sanford did the girls 50 yd. freestyle in 33.7, and also won the girls 50 yd. back crawl in 48 seconds. Last, but not least, she won the girls 50 yd. breast stroke in 49 seconds.

Jim Kunkel took honors in the 100 yd. breast stroke with a 1:23.3, and also withstood the hardships of the 200 yd. breast stroke event with 3:34.3. Although Noel Durbin didn't break any of his old records this time around, he proved swimming still comes easy by taking the 100 yd. freestyle in 2:32.

Gary Ricker won two events. First, the 50 yd. back crawl in 37.4, and the 100 yd. back crawl in 1:37.6. Joe Johnson ends the list of top performers with 18 seconds in the 25 yd. butterfly event.

The swimming event was moderately successful, but hopes are that more records will be broken in another meet coming in the spring. With fine swimmers like those above, plus Karen Bradshaw and David Musselman, along with Coach Dixie Horning, there's no doubt in my mind that records will be broken.

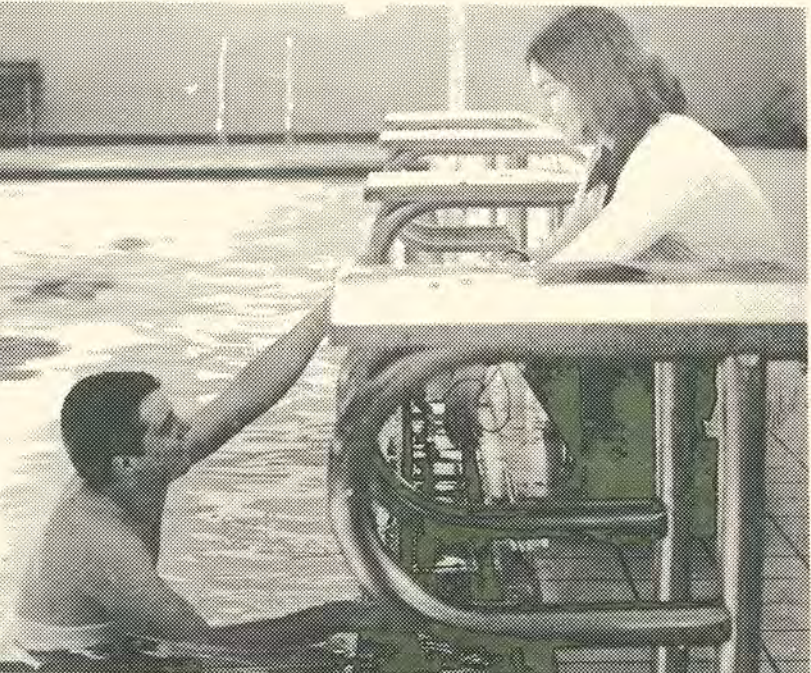

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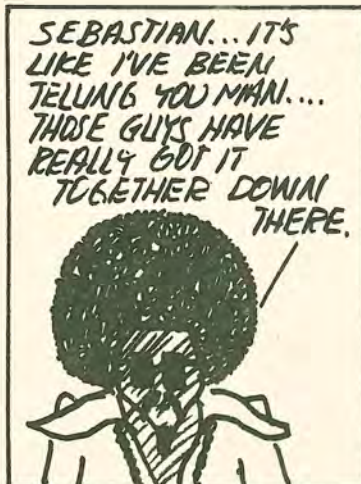
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
